Access to environmental information

Transparency in action

- Journalists, activists, campaigners, researchers and ordinary individuals are frequent users of both the Environmental Information Regulations 2004 and the Freedom of Information Act 2000
- We publish performance statistics and "league tables" for government bodies
- The Information Commissioner publishes decision notices on the results of investigations
- Appeals to the tribunals and courts are heard in public, except for brief discussions of sensitive information
- The government has two website for proactive disclosure of policy material - https://gov.uk/ - and data - https://data.gov.uk/ and other sites for specialist information

Alignment with the FOI Act where practical

The benefits


- One model for the practical side of access to information
 - · Easier for users and public authorities to understand
 - Similar but not identical access rights
 - Similar procedure for internal administrative reviews, ICO, tribunal appeals etc.
 - Both have a code of practice setting out standards to meet
- The role of the Information Commissioner
 - Independent regulator for both the EIRs and the FOIA issues decision notices
 - Guidance on both regimes
 - Practical advice for public and public authorities, database of decisions
 - Promotes "publication schemes" to standardise the information disclosed proactively by public authorities
- BUT
 - Differences in the details of exceptions and exemptions

Publication of performance statistics

Transparency in action

- Cabinet Office analyses and publishes the performance of 40 central government departments and other bodies which have significant policy-making, regulatory or information-handling functions
- Published quarterly and annually as national statistics
- Limited to requests for information, not proactive disclosure
- Easy-to-use "league tables"
- 46,681 FOI requests were received across all these bodies in 2017 a 3% increase on 2016
- Fewer than 1500 requests were for environmental information in 2017
- Used by the ICO for monitoring performance

Figures from What Do They Know

- 514,849 requests submitted since the site began
 - not all are true requests for recorded information
 - some are clearly not asking for recorded information
- 23,651 public authorities on the list
 - not all valid WDKT's wish-list of publicly-funded bodies, also some now defunct
- Range from huge city councils to government departments (ministries) to public museums and dentists
- Can see how many requests each public authority has received local authorities get the most
- Huge divergence in number of requests received by government departments - depends on the level of interest in their policies
- WDTK is a mySociety project run by a charity, run by volunteers

Proactive publication of data

- Air quality data from over 1500 monitoring sites https://uk-air.defra.gov.uk/data/ data and simple statistics
- Data.gov.uk data published by central government, local authorities and public bodies to help users build products and services
